He is a member of several professional organizations including the American Academy of Dermatology, the Society for Investigative Dermatology, the International Forum for the Study of Itch, and the Skin of Color Society.


**Roland Beverly, MD**

He completed his pediatric residency at Boston City and Yale-New Haven Hospitals and was a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Fellow in General Pediatrics at Yale.

He joined the faculty at Boston University School of Medicine in 1986, was promoted to Associate Professor in 1990, and to Professor in 1997. He became a member of the Society for Pediatric Research in 1996 and the American Pediatric Society in 2001. He is an Honorary Fellow of the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health.

**Antonella Tosti, MD**

Dr. Antonella Tosti is a Fredric Brandt Endowed Professor of Dermatology and Cutaneous Surgery at the University of Miami. She is a worldwide recognized expert in hair and nail disorders and contact dermatitis and has been invited to lecture at major international conferences.

Dr. Tosti is a founding member and past president of the European Hair Research Society and European Nail Society. She is a past president and member with the Board of Directors of the Council

of Nail Disorders. She is the Secretary & Treasurer of the North American Research Society. She is an editor of four textbooks on diagnosis and treatment of hair disorders and three textbooks on nail disorders. She is the author of Dermoscopy of Hair and Nails, the first hair and nail atlas on dermoscopy ever published. Professor Antonella Tosti is the author of over 700 scientific publications.



**Steven Wang, MD**

MEMORIAL SLOAN KETTERING CANCER CENTER

Steven Wang, MD is a board-certified dermatologist and Mohs surgeon with extensive experience in diagnosing and treating skin cancer using a combination of surgical and noninvasive techniques. He cares for patients at MSK's outpatient location in Basking Ridge, New Jersey.

Dr. Wang completed a fellowship training in dermatologic surgeries to remove basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell cancer, melanomas, and other skin cancers. In addition, Dr. Wang has an active research

program and has published four books on skin cancer and more than 85 publications in medical journals and textbooks. He has also lectured extensively on the prevention, diagnosis, and management of skin cancers. Since joining MSK Basking Ridge 12 years ago as head of the dermatology program, Dr. Wang has performed more than 5,000 Mohs surgeries and other dermatologic surgeries.



**Susan C. Taylor, MD**

Susan C. Taylor, MD is the Founding Director, Skin of Color Center, St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center and Faculty, Perelman School of Medicine, Associate Professor of Dermatology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Taylor is board-certified in Dermatology (1989), and Internal Medicine (1986). After completing medical school at Harvard Medical School, she

went on to her complete her residency at Pennsylvania Hospital. Dr. Taylor also completed her Fellowship program at New York-Presbyterian/Columbia University Medical Center. She founded the Skin of Color Society in 2004 and served as the organization's first president.



**Pearl Grimes, MD**

THE GRIMES CENTER FOR MEDICAL AND AESTHETIC DERMATOLOGY

Pearl E. Grimes MD, FAAD is the Director of the Vitiligo & Pigmentation Institute of Southern California and is highly renowned international authority on vitiligo and pigmentary disorders. Dr. Grimes is currently serving as a Clinical Professor of Dermatology at UCLA. Her all-encompassing and dedicated approach to treating these disorders has attracted patients from various regions of the world for her expertise. She is both a clinician, researcher, and orator, lecturing globally on pigmentation disorders. She has also shared her expertise on cosmetic procedures such as fillers, chemical peeling, and microdermabrasion.

Dr. Grimes has received recognition within the field by being awarded the prestigious Dermatology Foundation "Practitioner of the Year" Award in 2011 and the Women's Dermatological Society "Mentor of the Year" award. She was placed on LA Magazine's Super Doctors list for five consecutive years and on the "Best Doctors of America" list for the previous 12 years. Dr. Grimes was named as one of Hollywood's Top Doctors by her peers for 2014 and 2015 in The Hollywood Reporter. Dr. Grimes is known for her ongoing research and is actively involved in performing Clinical Trials.
